COVID-19 VACCINE

With distribution of the COVID-19 vaccine now under way, the priority is to immunize frontline health care workers, public safety and essential workers, long-term nursing home residents and those over 65, as outlined by the NYS Department of Health. Following this initial phase, which will require several weeks, the process will move to vaccinating all Long Islanders.

The U.S. Food & Drug Administration granted Emergency Use Authorization to the vaccine

because in trials with tens of thousands of participants it showed itself to be extremely effective, close to 95%, with little or no side effects, lasting only 24-48 hours.

“It’s important to point out that in developing a vaccine for COVID-19, researchers weren’t starting from scratch,” notes Catholic Health Executive Vice President and Chief Clinical Officer Patrick M. O’Shaughnessy, DO, MBA, MS-PopH, FACEP, CHCQM. “Past research on SARS (Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome) and MERS (Middle East Respiratory Syndrome) had already identified potential approaches.”

Other key COVID-19 vaccine facts from the U.S. Centers of Disease Control and Prevention (CDC):

The COVID-19 vaccination will help protect you from getting the SARS-CoV-2 corona virus. Two doses are needed, to be administered three to four weeks apart.

After receiving the COVID-19 vaccine, you may experience some side effects. This is a normal sign that your body is building protection. Side effects may feel like flu but should go away within 24-48 hours.

Vaccine doses purchased with

U.S. taxpayer dollars will be given to the American people at no cost.

The first COVID-19 vaccines being used have been authorized for emergency use by the FDA. Other vaccines are being developed and tested and are expected in the months ahead.

COVID-19 vaccines are one of the many important tools to help stop this pandemic. The CDC continues to encourage you to cover your mouth and nose with a mask when around others, stay at least six feet away from others, avoid crowds and wash your hands often.

FRIENDS ANNUAL MEETING GOES VIRTUAL

MESSAGE FROM JEFFREY B. MULHALL

THE GIVING GARDEN

This past summer the Friends of Mercy sponsored Mercy Hospital's vegetable garden located on the grounds of Mercy. In the years past the garden was maintained by avid gardener and Mercy employee Vito Leone, but due to his intense job obligations caused by COVID-19, Vito did not have the time to maintain the garden. Thanks to the Friends of Mercy for stepping in. Under the leadership of Gloria DiSciullo, Dir. of Special Events, and with the help of several Mercy employees, plants were ordered and planted. Throughout the summer, the garden was cultivated and maintained by the team.

The Friends named the garden "The Giving Garden" since it supplied fresh vegetables to the nuns on Mercy's campus (Nursing Sisters of the Sick Poor) and people facing hunger in the community. While vegetable plants were sold out in the local nurseries, the FOM were able to

obtain plants from FOM member Keith of Art Flower & Gift Shoppe in RVC. The garden had a late planting start due to COVID-19, but that didn't stop the Friends. The garden grew a variety of vegetables such as all types of tomatoes, cucumbers, eggplant, red and green peppers, radish, and zucchini. The garden was extremely bountiful and harvested a couple hundred pounds of fresh produce.

Weekly deliveries were made to the sisters, and additionally to several food pantries in the community such as the St. Agnes Food Pantry and the Vineyard Church Food Pantry.

Millions of families across America use food pantries every day. However, it's usually not easy for food pantries to keep healthy, fresh produce available to all of the people they help. A community garden can reduce food insecurity and improve dietary intake. The COVID-19 pandemic put many people out of work and significantly increased the need for donated food. "Our locally grown fresh food garden will help fill the gap for those who would other-

wise be unable to afford nutritious food, and this expansion further demonstrates Mercy's commitment to addressing the underlying social factors that affect a patient's health" said Gloria DiSciullo. The FOM were proud to sponsor The Giving Garden that provided fresh vegetables to the sisters and those in need.


six decades beginning with his participation in the Mercy Ball Honor Guard in 1943.

I hope the New Year is finding you well.

While the past year has been challenging because of the pandemic, I am proud to inform you that with adaptability and innovative thinking, we have been able to continue working on important projects and initiatives at Mercy Hospital. It is with great excitement that I provide an update on two of these initiatives:

Family Care Center

Mercy was awarded transformation grant funds from the Department of Health and Mother Cabrini to enhance patient access for the Medicaid

and underserved populations. With those funds, Mercy is planning on replacing the old convent to develop a new state-of-the-art two-story 16,000 square-foot medical office building and move its existing outpatient medical clinics located in 5,000 square feet in the hospital (Family Care Center) to this new outpatient setting place. The new building will help expand existing Family Care Center services and expand new clinical services, including primary care, cardiology and endocrinology. It will also free up space in the hospital to provide additional clinical

services. Construction has started with an anticipated completion date of early 2022.

St. Francis Cardiovascular at Mercy Hospital

The award-winning St. Francis cardiovascular program is now available closer to home for many Long Island residents with new cardiac catheterization services offered at Mercy Hospital. Supported by a team of renowned cardiac physicians from St. Francis Hospital & Heart Center®, the additional services will include percutaneous coronary intervention (PCI). This procedure uses a catheter to

place a stent to open the heart's blood vessels that have been narrowed by plaque buildup.

Lastly, staying vital and healthy is important to one's overall general well-being. More important than ever, reducing the spread of respiratory illnesses, such as the flu, this winter is critical. According to the CDC, the best way to prevent seasonal flu is to get vaccinated and I strongly encourage you to get a flu shot, if you haven't done so already, to protect yourself, your family and your community.
